NEW and **IMPORTANT** - Scouting for Food 2021

1. We will not have paper bags or plastic bags to hand out this year. This change is NOT due to Covid 19. Instead, approx. 32 states have placed bans on the use of plastic bags. This has created a nationwide shortage of brown paper bags and Harris Teeter does not have access to

150,000 bags for a special SFF print job. This policy shift has also disrupted the plastic bag industry and Harris Teeter does not have access to 150,000 plastic bags for a special print job either. SOOOOOO, Harris Teeter will be able to print card stock door hangers that can be hung on door handles or placed in paper boxes. The door hangers will include dates and times for SFF collection, a list of products most needed, ask people to use bags and/or boxes they already have for their collection, an online giving option, and a place for units to write in their unit number/name so residents know which unit came to their house. Loaves & Fishes staff will design the door hanger and we will include a mock-up with the online Leaders Guide. FYI, for those who choose the online giving option, \$1.00 will purchase four (4) pounds of food for a family in need.

- 2. Roundtable sign-ups and door hanger distribution. Please ask units to cover the same neighborhoods they have covered in prior years. If a unit backs out, please try to get another unit to cover these areas. Instead of bags, we will give units an equal number of door hangers so the numbers they have used in previous years should remain the same. We are still developing a plan to distribute the door hangers and this will depend on when Roundtables begin to meet in person again. If they meet in person in January then we will have them at the January meetings. Otherwise, we will make arrangements for the door hangers to be picked up at the Scout Office or Loaves & Fishes. I will let you know when a distribution plan has been finalized.
- 3. Scouts at the Door. Some units have opted to set up tables outside of Harris Teeter stores and solicit donations from customers. We are checking with Harris Teeter to determine if this is still permitted in the world of Covid 19. I will share this info with you when I hear back from Harris Teeter and the Leaders Guide will be updated to reflect any new requirements.
- 4. Collection sites/locations will stay the same as last year.
- 5. Sorting and bag counting will not happen at collection sites this year. Because of Covid 19, we are asking units to "Drop and Dash". Units will bring their bags/boxes of food to the normal collection sites/locations. Catawba Lodge members will assist with unloading food from vehicles. Bags will not be counted at drop-off. However, units are encouraged to count their own bags if this is important to them. NO SORTING will happen at the collection sites. Instead, the bags of food will be transferred by Catawba Lodge members and other volunteers directly into the large boxes that are in each Loaves & Fishes trailer. The food will be hauled to the Loaves & Fishes warehouse where it will be stored and sorted by volunteers utilizing appropriate social distancing guidelines.

Loaves & Fishes encourages units to sign up to help sort. Sorters must be at least age 10 or older and group sizes are currently limited to 10 people. This number may increase as North Carolina Covid 19 guidelines are updated. They ask groups to commit to a 2-hour shift and they are currently open until 6 pm on weekdays. Weekend shifts may be added if needed. This is a great way for units to give back to their community and to earn service hours. The sign-up process will be added to the Leaders Guide.

Scouts must complete requirements before December 31, 2021.

Requirements are discussed at 6:40 and following on the video.

Scouts must earn 4 merit badges, including 1 merit badge from each of 3 groups, one from Animal Studies Group (Bird Study or Insect Study or Mammal Study or Reptile and Amphibian Study),

one from Outdoor Activity Group (Backpacking, Camping, Canoeing, Climbing, Gardening), one from Earth Sciences Group (Energy, Forestry, Geology, Oceanography, Plant Science, Weather).

The fourth merit badge is Public Health.

Scouts must also participate in an Environmental or Public Health Community Service project for 6 hours of service.

BSA Distinguished Conservation Service Award

In early November, 2020, BSA announced a new conservation award program to replace the Hornaday Award program. Information is posted at

Youth awards must be earned. Scouts must develop and execute 2 significant projects, involving research, collaboration and project planning, completion, and education.

"The projects must be developed under the guidance and pre-approval of the Scout's Unit Leader, a BSA Distinguished Conservation Service Award Adviser, and the Council Conservation Committee. One of the projects may include the Scout's Eagle Scout project (if applicable). All projects must contribute to environment improvement on a long-term scale."

Conservation and STEM Subcommittees

The Council Advancement Committee has recently developed a subcommittee to promote conservation-related and STEM-related activities and awards. Tony Roux is a Senior

Environmental Specialist with Mecklenburg County and will serve as chair. Stuart Tucker and Scott Phillips will also participate.

The Conservation-STEM Subcommittee invites Scouts who are interested in earning any of the BSA Supernova STEM Awards or a BSA Distinguished Conservation Service Award to consult with the committee before beginning requirements. These awards will require sustained effort over 2 to 4 years. With continuous consultation with a trained Adviser offering guidance from the outset, the Scout's work and documents will be significantly more likely attain a level of quality and depth to qualify for BSA National review. A Scout presenting a completed binder and application form for a signature without on-going collaboration with mentors and advisors is not likely to meet the rigorous standards in place for a successful submission and review. ADVANCEMENT NEWS:

Eagle Project Proposal Reviews during COVID-19 (Update as of 10/23/2020) Having moved into Phase Three of the Governor's Plan to reopen North Carolina, the Mecklenburg County Council's Advancement Committee has approved in-person reviews of Eagle Projects. Inperson Project Proposal reviews will occur at St. Vincent de Paul Catholic Church beginning with the November 12 Roundtable day. Reviews will begin at 6:00 p.m. Please note the new time.

We will not be in a position to accept walk in reviews, so please

contact Apache.advancement@gmail.com to schedule the review. Upon receipt of the request for review, the Scout will receive instructions as to how to proceed at St. Vincent de Paul Catholic Church on the night of the review. The Scout will receive an email with a phone number for notifying the reviewers of their arrival. When a reviewer is prepared for the Scout, the Scout will receive a text letting the Scout that they may proceed into the building. Please do NOT enter the building until a text has been received permitting entrance.

Masks will be required at all times while the Scout is in the building. The reviews will be set up in a socially distant manner to minimize the risks. If the Scout or anyone with whom the Scout has been in close contact show COVID infection symptoms, please err do not attend in person.

For those Scouts that do not feel comfortable meeting in person, the Scout is to follow the normal protocol of requesting a review request via email to Apache.advancement@gmail.com. Please note in the email that you are requesting a virtual review. With their email review requests, Scouts may attach their Eagle Project Proposal Workbooks and other documents, such as worksite maps, project construction plans, additional pages with details of any logistics,

and safety plans, as needed. These requests will be distributed periodically to Eagle Project Reviewers. Once a reviewer has been assigned, the reviewer will contact the Scout (with a copy to another adult to maintain 2-deep leadership) to plan a virtual review.

Age-Extension Beyond the 18th Birthday for Eagle Requirements during COVID-19 (Update as of 8/30/20)

The National Council of BSA has issued updated guidelines, which now provide that Local councils will now be given authority by the National Council to grant an additional three-month extension, which will end **December 31, 2020**

National guideline dated 8/30/20 interpreted by the Council Advancement Committee:

- Life Scout turns 18 on 12/15/20
 - o one extension of up to 3-months allowed ending on 3/14/21
 - § Since the extension ends after 12/31/2020, the Council cannot grant another extension
- Life Scout turns 18 between 3/31/20 and 6/30/20
 - o Up to 3 extensions allowed through 12/31/20
 - o The Scout should request an extension up to 3 times the original and as the first and second expire
 - § The first extension would end 3 months after the 18th birthday and each further extension 3 months thereafter until the extension granted between 10/1/20 and 12/31/20 which would be the last one the council may grant
- Life Scout turns 18 between 9/1/20 and 11/30/20
 - o Up to two extensions allowed
 - o The first extension runs 3 months from the 18th birthday between 9/1/20 and 11/30/20
 - § If the Scout then needs a second extension, then a second 3-months extension request is submitted and approved through a date ending 6 months after the 18th birthday but no later than 2/28/21

NOTE: The 3 month extensions are months and not 90 days and thus a Scout turning 18 on 11/13/20 getting an extension would have until 2/12/21 to complete the Eagle requirements. **Scouts must specifically request age extension** beyond 18 to continue pursuing Eagle Scout requirements by submitting an Age-Extension Form, 512-077 (2020 Printing) available at https://filestore.scouting.org/filestore/pdf/512-077.pdf, to Joel Moser, Council Advancement Chair, at joelmoser@earthlink.net.

Eagle Application Packet Processing, Update as of 5/27/2020

With the Council office and Scout Shop now open with its normal operating hours, a Scout or troop leader may drop off a newly completed Eagle application packet during Scout Shop hours. If the Scout or leader is uncomfortable with entering the Scout Shop, he or she should call the Scout Shop number 704 342 9323 when they arrive at the Council office and let Scout Shop Manager Jennifer Adkins know that they have an Eagle packet to leave. She will come out to their car to retrieve the packet. Laura Bachelder of the Council staff will review the application material for completeness and notify the District Eagle Scout Board of Review Coordinator that the application is ready to be picked up.

Eagle Scout Boards of Review, Update as of 5/27/2020

Having moved into Phase 2 of the Governor's Plan to reopen North Carolina, the Mecklenburg County Council's Advancement Committee has approved the following: Effective immediately, in-person Eagle Boards of Review can now be resumed if all parties are comfortable and feel safe following CDC guidelines. Virtual Eagle Boards of Review are an option if in-person Eagle

Boards of Review are not possible. In-person Eagle Boards of Review are encouraged where the situation allows.

The District Advancement Chairs, along with the District Advancement Committees, will immediately start expediting the backlog of Eagle Scout packets submitted to the Scout Office during the COVID shutdown. Also, Eagle Scout packets ready to be turned in may be submitted to the Scout Office during normal working hours.

If units are restricted from their normal EBOR meeting place for COVID reasons and have no other option, the conference rooms at the Scout Office are available. Please contact your District Advancement Chair, or District Director, to reserve a date and space at the Scout Office for your EBOR.

Utilization of outdoor facilities such as public parks where one might have access to picnic tables and benches is another option.

After an Eagle Board, a District Eagle Board Reviewer can return the signed Eagle application and all letters of recommendation to the Council office by following the same schedule and process.

Blue Card and Advancement Report Processing

Advancement reports (with supporting blue cards and/or summer camp advancement reports) can be mailed in or dropped off at any time in the mail slot at the back door of the office (the mail slot is 1.5 inches tall) Although many troops use Scoutbook for advancement reports, some may use the BSA Advancement form as posted

at https://filestore.scouting.org/filestore/pdf/34403.pdf. Blue cards are very strongly recommended to all Scouts and to all troops because blue card records can be invaluable to confirm merit badges for Star, Life, and especially for Eagle Boards of Review.

After the Scout Shop receives the reports and cards, processing may take up to 7 to 10 business days. Troop leaders should please include contact information so that the Scout Shop can call when reports and blue cards are ready for pickup. Pickup can occur during curbside Scout Shop hours, currently Tuesdays and Fridays from 12:00 noon to 3:00 p.m. If leaders would like to purchase badges, they can note it with the packet delivery or can email a copy of the advancement report to Scout Shop Manager Jennifer Adkins

at <u>jennifer.adkins@scouting.org</u> so that badges can be pulled for curbside pickup. Costs for badges can be deducted from unit Scout Shop accounts with express permission from an authorized user or can be paid for by credit card.

Signatures for advancements

All advancement reports require at least one signature. If any ranks 1st Class and above are listed on the report, 3 signatures are still required. Unit leaders can send e-signatures by email to Council Program Assistant Laura Bachelder at laura.bachelder@scouting.org

In addition, a similar number of Scouts presented had their Eagle Project Proposals to members of the District Advancement Committee for their review of the projects prior to the Scout's commencement of their project. As Scouting grows in the Apache District, so does our need for Project Proposal reviewers and Eagle Board reviewers. Project Proposal reviews occur on Roundtable nights on the second Thursday of each month at St. Vincent de Paul Church beginning at 6:00 p.m. Eagle Boards of Review are usually scheduled on troop meeting nights with the respective Scoutmasters. Eagle Application Packets with Complete Merit Badge Advancement Records Requested Life Scouts and Troop Advancement Chairs: please include a printout of a Scout's advancement record from Scoutbook or from the Scout's ScoutNet profile from the Council office, including all merit badges earned, in the Eagle Application Packet that goes to Council. These records will allow the Troop and the Council to promptly process recognition of the Scout with Eagle Palms, if the Scout qualifies.

First aid kit supplies and survival kit supplies are available in the Mecklenburg County Council Scout Shop so that dens, patrols, and individual Scouts have resources for these advancement requirements:

Webelos First Responder requirement # 6. Put together a simple home first-aid kit. Explain what you included and how to use each item correctly.

Webelos Walkabout requirement # 2. Assemble a first-aid kit suitable for your hike or activity. **Tenderfoot** requirement # 4d. Assemble a personal first-aid kit to carry with you on future campouts and hikes. Tell how each item in the kit would be used.

First Aid Merit Badge requirement # 5. Do the following:

(a) Prepare a first-aid kit for your home. Display and discuss its contents with your counselor.

(b) With an adult leader, inspect your troop's first-aid kit. Evaluate it for completeness. Report your findings to your counselor and Scout leader

Webelos-AOL Castaway Requirement # 2. Do all of the following.

A. Learn what items should be in an outdoor survival kit that you can carry in a small bag or box in a day pack. Assemble your own small survival kit, and explain to your den leader why the items you chose are important for survival.

First Aid Skill - What is a "ring string"?

A ring string is used to compress swelling from a finger where a ring is stuck and otherwise cannot be removed. Swelling might occur from arthritis, trauma, infection, burn, or medical conditions like heart or kidney diseases that cause fluid retention. A ring string could be string, a strand of paracord core, fishing line, dental floss, sewing thread, narrow ribbon, a rubber band. A ring string can be wrapped from fingertip toward the ring to force swelling under the ring. A tooth pick, a rounded end of a safety pin, a pen tip cover, or other fine blunt probe can be used to push the string beneath the ring. By gently pulling on the end of the string passing beneath the ring, the ring string unwinds off the finger and pushes the ring toward the fingertip where it is removed. If swelling is only partially improved by the first wrapping, the wrapping and removal process can be repeated. Applying hand lotion or cooking oil or soap as lubrication to the swollen finger can allow the ring to slide off more easily.
