2020 Hornet's Nest District Klondike Derby

Location: Camp Grimes - Mecklenburg Scout Reservation

Date: February 28, 2020 – March 1, 2020, 2019 (Fri-Sat-Sun)

Event: The Klondike Derby is a Scouts BSA competition for younger Scouts with a focus on Tenderfoot through First Class skills, and a leadership event for older experienced Scouts who are eligible to participate as “staff” members or Yukon Rangers. Patrols of scouts pull a Klondike style dogsled on a course that passes through cities and stations named for cities in Alaska and perform tasks to accumulate points.

Registration

Deadline: Your Troop's registration must be completed online and the associated camporee fees are due in the Council office by Wednesday February 19, 2020. Registration opens Sunday December 1, 2019.

Fees: The advance registration fee is \$18 per person and covers the event and all camporee fees. NOTE: Klondike staff will be providing Saturday dinner ONLY; your troop is responsible for all other meals. \$13 per person if not wanting Saturday dinner.

Age

Requirement: Scouts who are under the age of fourteen as of March 2, 2020 will be eligible to compete as part of a Klondike sled team. Scouts who are fourteen or over by March 2, 2020 are eligible to participate as a staff member or a Yukon Ranger.

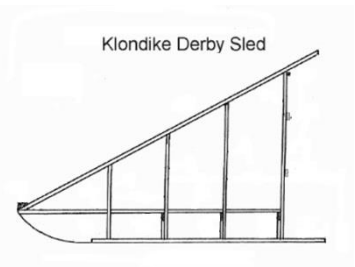
Age Requirement Exemption for 2020: Hornets Nest units that were founded after February 1, 2019 will be exempted from the Klondike sled team age requirements.

Patrol Size: A patrol (or sled team) may have no more than 8 and no less than 5 members to participate. (Klondike staff may grant an exception with advance notice.)

Check-in: All patrols and troops are required to check-in prior to camp setup to insure you receive the latest Klondike information. Check-in is by Scoutmaster and Patrol leader at the Health Lodge where your final patrol roster is confirmed, camping location, duty roster responsibilities and review important Klondike information with the patrol leader. (For example, maps, schedule, home base and late breaking news) Troops and Patrols should plan to check-in between 7:00 PM and 9:00 PM on Friday of the event. (Late arrivals may delay your ability to set up and be prepared.)

Sled Specification:

Sleds must be designed to carry your supplies and be pulled using a rope or tow bridle. Sleds should be about 6 feet long, 1-½ feet wide and resemble the sled on the right. Sleds should be sturdy enough to carry your patrol's provisions during the event. The frame including runners must be made of wood to reflect the history of the Klondike gold rush. Your sled should have your patrol name and troop number displayed. A tow bridle can be made of rope or webbing.



Competition

Basics:

The Klondike trail passes through cities and stations named for cities in Alaska. Your patrol will be assigned a “home base” and every 40 minutes you will be instructed to pull your sled to the next city and perform the task. Cities are worth 20 points and stations are worth 10 points and although stations are optional each patrol should keep track of their time in order to attempt the task at both the city and the station. Along the trail, your patrol will need to use scout skills, leadership, and teamwork to complete tasks and score points. Some specific scout skills include camping, cooking, first aid, hiking, knots, lashings, compass, and good Scout Spirit. Keeping your patrol sled in good working order is always a plus.

Breakfast - Your patrol will fix a hot breakfast which will be **judged by the staff in your camping location**. This breakfast should be prepared, served, consumed, and cleaned up before the patrol gathers and travels to your Patrol’s assigned home base.

Your patrols will eat lunch in the Klondike city you are in at 1:00 PM. (a bag lunch that the patrol has prepared before the start of the event.) This meal will not be judged, but must be properly cleaned up when finished.

Scout leaders are discouraged from “coaching” patrols beyond the “first city” as this may take away from the competition for your patrol. The staff at each Klondike city is responsible for answering questions and providing instructions for their city task. All staff members and Yukon Rangers should assist or redirect patrols lost on the trail.

Scoring:

The staff in each Klondike City scores the city event based on 4 main categories, Leadership, Teamwork, Scout Sprit and Task Completion. Stations are scored by performing the task or answering questions. Each patrol will receive a score for:

- Each city and station attempted
- Saturday breakfast judged by the leaders in your campsite

Awards will be presented at the Campfire Saturday night for overall score and best spirit, in addition, each Klondike city may present a “city award” for the patrol that performed well in their city.

Leadership /

Camp Manners:

Patrol leaders are responsible for the behavior of their patrol. If a patrol leader is experiencing problems, he is encouraged to ask for assistance from staff members or Yukon Rangers.

Yukon Rangers:

Yukon Rangers should be posted in each city to assist the troop hosting the city. Yukon Rangers are event staff and must be treated as such by competing patrols.

Chapel Service:

Sunday Morning Worship will be at 8:30 AM at the Chapel Area. Class A uniform is expected.

Closing Ceremony:

Closing is at 9:00 AM on Sunday morning or immediately following worship. Class A uniform is expected.

Checkout:

After breaking camp, Patrols will have their campsite inspected and their assigned camp duty roster responsibility completed and approved by Klondike staff before departing.

2020 Klondike Derby Sled Team Equipment Checklist

The following equipment should be neatly packed on your sled.

- Blanket
- Compass
- Map of Course (*Will be provided by Klondike Staff*)
- Rain gear for each team member
- Notebook and Pencil
- Scout Handbook and/or Field book
- Flashlight
- 100 Feet of Twine
- Three 6 ft. staves (no hooks on ends)
- Kindling or fire starters. No liquid fuel or anything soaked in a combustible substance.
- Matches in a waterproof container or flint and steel or hot sparks
- Seven 8 ft. lengths of 1/4" or 1/2" rope
- First Aid Kit (including at least 3 dressings, 2 compresses, 8 cravats or triangular bandages, and 16 Band-Aids)
- Lunch for all team members
- Nugget Bag
